## **ROOTED**

It doesn't seem possible, but John and I have been members of Pilgrim for over 40 years. We were married by Pastor Don Haines back in 1984. When our two daughters were born, they were both baptized by Pastor Rick DeBenedetto. Rachel was confirmed by Pastors Dennis and Paulette Creswell. Pastor Dennis presided over my mother's funeral. Lindsey was confirmed by Pastor Paulette, who also presided over her 2015 wedding. Three of our grandchildren were baptized at Pilgrim, by Vicars Will and Pat. Pilgrim Lutheran Church has been part of so many important times in our lives. John often reminds me that "We have roots here."

The years have flown by and times have changed. There are few people in the pews on any given Sunday. Those Pastors who used to be a stable cornerstone in our church lives have moved on. There are few new pastoral candidates graduating from seminaries. The future seems uncertain. Have we become too comfortable, too rooted with our church?

A number of years ago, I was given a small black book, "The Essential

Lutheran Handbook, 500 Anniversary, Even Smaller Pocket Edition (2017.)" The cover has a depiction of Martin Luther winking. To paraphrase the forward of the book, Luther is winking at the reader to remind us that though theology is serious stuff, we should remember that Jesus saves us and our life in the church should be experienced with some humor and love for one another. The forward notes that Luther's theology is "illuminated by a down to earth, everyday sense of humor." An example of this humor is Luther's favorite way to banish the devil, break wind (fart) according to the book.

There is a chapter called "Church Stuff," which caught my eye as I pondered the passage of time and changes at Pilgrim. It talks about Luther questioning how to identify the true Christian Church on Earth. The Augsburg Confession is an important document for Lutherans. Article 7 of this document claims that the "one Holy Christian Church is the assembly of all believers among whom the gospel is rightly preached and the holy sacraments are administered

according to the gospel." Different than some other Christian denominations. Lutherans are organized around the purely preached Word and the giving of sacraments rather than organizing around popes and bishops. Today, bishops in the Lutheran Church are simply leaders in geographic areas according to the book. In Luther's time harsh criticisms were aimed at Catholic popes and bishops who did not support the pure preaching of the gospel. Luther, after all, was the fellow who painstakingly translated the Bible into German that ultimately allowed it to be printed for commoners to read for themselves.

As I consider what the outcome of church consolidation might be, it seems that staying true to Luther's teachings should be at the heart of our conversations. Pastors, leaders, buildings and programs change over time as does society. Maybe it is time to plant our roots in the fertile soil already here and find some humor and love along the way.

As we enter the Lenten Season, we get serious, turning toward God to consider how our lives need to change. We consider the blessing of each new day. We remember our baptism and the loving gift we have been given in our Savior, Jesus Christ. We mourn Jesus'

death for our sake, according to the "purely preached Word" as Luther believed. The structure of church may be a bit different, but Luther is still winking at us.

## "Jesus, source of living water, may we drink of you and live!"

-the refrain to the Lenten hymn "As the Deer Runs to the River"

March finds the Lutheran Church in the season of Lent, a time meant for us to reflect in a personal way on the meaning of our Christian faith. It is a time for us to realistically confront the challenges and failings in our lives. It is also a time for us to prepare for Easter, our greatest source of hope.

One of the hymns on page 331 of our ELW hymnbook, "As the Deer Runs to the River", helps to guide us on this journey. It begins with a paraphrase of Psalm 42 verse 1 "As the deer pants for streams of water, so my soul pants for you, O God". The image of a deer running to get a drink in a stream or river is very familiar to those of us in Central Wisconsin. After all, deer are our next-door neighbors. It is quite amazing how this common image can help us reflect on where we often are in our lives and also on what we seek.

As the deer runs to the river, parched and weary from the chase, we have come from hurt and hurry, thirsting for your healing grace.

"Come and drink," Isaiah summoned, "all who for God's mercy plead! God's forgiveness, like a fountain, flows to satisfy your need."

Christ, we come from desert places, deepest thirst unsatisfied. Lead us to the waters flowing from the cross on which you died.

Jesus, source of living water, may we drink of you and live!

We all find times in our lives where we are parched and weary from the chase. It is a great comfort to us when we find God's healing grace. What can be a better metaphor for healing grace, God's mercy, and forgiveness than coming to a river of cool water where we can be cooled and refreshed?

I find the final verse to this hymn especially touching and meaningful. It is a prayer that honestly, without pretense, admits to God that we come from places in our lives that feel like deserts. We come from places where our thirst for mercy, forgiveness, and grace feels distant. Then the prayer leads us to the place of a Christian's ultimate hope—"to the waters flowing from the cross on which you died."

Each ministry will then coordinate a menu, the specific volunteer roles needed and where or how you would like to direct that day's free-will offering.

Each week we will provide lunch for approximately 25-40 lunch worshipers and 60-75 for the evening meal. (Numbers are estimates at this point) Groups should plan to have volunteers for setup, serving, dishwashing and cleanup for lunch and supper. ## LWR PERSONAL CARE KITS—LENTEN COLLECTION

This year, during Lent, we will collect items for personal care kits for Lutheran World Relief. Cleanliness may not actually be next to godliness, but it certainly helps a person feel more human. When families find their homes destroyed, or must flee for their safety, soap and a towel rarely make the cut for what they can carry. Arriving in a refugee camp or other place of safety, they are scared, vulnerable, and dirty from the travel. The simple items included in a Personal Care Kit provide much-needed self-care, critical germ fighting, and the chance to regain dignity amidst situations of fear and uncertainty. Items needed are:

Metal nail clippers (attached file optional)

Two or three bath-size bars of soap equaling 8 to 9 oz. (any brand, in original wrapping; no mini or hotel size bars)



Adult-size toothbrushes in their original packaging (toothbrush multi-packs are acceptable)



Lightweight cotton or cotton blend bath-size towel (20" x 40" to 52" x 27"), dark color recommended.



Sturdy combs (no picks or fine-toothed combs.)

### TREASURER'S REPORT:

(Charlie Freiberg) Reviewed financial reports for January 2025. Cash in banks totaled \$80,951, with \$22,429 held in restricted

funds. The largest portion of restricted funds is for Blessings that Give Hope of \$13,367. Our longterm loan stands at \$59,931. Contributions for the month were lower than usual as there were only three worship Sundays. Due to inclement weather, worship was cancelled on January 19th. The church equity stands at \$20,195 (Cash-debts) Expenses are in line with prior months. The Evangelism restricted funds line item will be deleted and the \$551.68 will be moved to the checking account. This was set aside at one time to pay for commercial expenses and will no longer be used for that purpose. It will be necessary to change the signatories for the following bank accounts:

the signatories of the accounts as well as closing the Evangelism checking account. Jim Lenselink seconded it. Motion carried.

#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

(Jean Trempe) Jean received a call from Pastor Dara Clifford-Associate to the Bishop and Director of Evangelical Mission regarding our interest in an Intern. She was responding to a call that Shirley Ecker made several weeks ago regarding our application for an Intern or Student which requires information about a supervising Pastor. The Synod is responsible for working with the seminaries to place an intern and identify a supervising Pastor. Pastor Dara offered to assist.

Jean discussed some priorities for the year.

- Support the Mission of the Consolidation Task Force Work continues as the group looks for ways to be "Better Together." The three worship teams have been working together for quite some time to find ways we can worship together. Should our next step be to start collaborating in other areas of the life of the congregations? An example would be a quilter's luncheon or collections of assorted items for local non-profits. Noisy Offerings are being done at St. Stephen and Good Shepherd on a regular basis. Would it be possible if Pilgrim began that practice too as a way to be better together? All three congregations agree that evangelism is not being done as well as it should be. How can we improve in this
- Keep in touch with members of our Congregation. Jean would like to see us stay "more in touch" with the Pil-

grim members who do not attend worship on a regular basis. We currently send holiday cards to stay in touch. She is looking for ideas on how to reach out to these individuals. It was mentioned that care packages will be going out to the three Pilgrim college students soon.

Jean attended her first President's meeting on January 28, 2025. This group will meet again on February 25 at St. Stephen at 6:30 p.m. Bethany, St. John's Mosinee and Mount Calvary are ironing out the details of a shared ministry, sharing one Pastor. First English is preparing to gain congregational support for hiring a Pastoral candidate. Immanuel is still reviewing options. There are no changes for St. Andrew at this time.

Vacant council positions were the next topic of discussion. Currently there are two openings, Children and Youth and Evangelism. Jean will continue to ask members for volunteers.

At the annual meeting, there were no volunteers for the Nominations Committee for 2026 openings. The opening is for a member at large to serve along with two prior council members.

The Audit Committee is also in need of two volunteers. These individuals will look over Pilgrim's financial records to verify everything is being done properly. This is done prior to the annual meeting after all year end income and expenses have been completed.

If any council member needs a copy of Pilgrim's By-Laws or church policies, they can be obtained from the office.

Community Blood Bank will no longer offer blood drives at Pilgrim. They require at least fifteen

people each time. We have not met that quota. There are other locations around the area to donate blood such as the Red Cross, Community Blood Bank and Good Shepherd.

Jean reminded the council members to sign up for an "Opening Devotion" month.

The council will continue to meet on the second Tuesday of the month at 6:30 p.m.

VICE PRESIDENT'S RE-PORT: (Frank Koerten)-No Report

TRANSITION TASK FORCE REPORT: (Kay Palmer) Kay reported that the GPS Team met for an all-day Saturday work session. Her impression of the day was a good one. It felt like the group made some substantial progress especially in the area of "Where is each congregation at.". She also felt like they were starting to work together more as a group instead of three separate entities.
