HAPPY VALENTINE'S DAY!

February 14 is the day we express our love for family and friends with cards, candy, flowers, and a special dinner. Valentine's Day originated as a Christian feast day to honor a martyr named St. Valentine with multiple stories about him including one that he was a priest who secretly married soldiers in defiance of the Roman emperor's ban on marriage. Legend shows that before Valentine was executed on February 14, he sent a love letter to his jailer's daughter, signing it "from your Valentine."

I enjoy listening to people share their Valentine's Day stories, hearing the barber shop quartets and University choirs that go and sing a special song picked especially for them from their loved ones. John 3:16 states, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." "Furnace Fund Kick-off"

Whether you own or rent a home, there are always things that need attention and sometimes they are costly. It may be routine maintenance, but sometimes repairs are more major and can catch us by surprise. Some repairs just need to be done. Costly repairs can cause some financial stress in our households. The same holds true for our House of Worship.

We have not talked about furnaces in some time. Most of you are aware that our House of Worship has 11 furnaces. The furnaces are checked periodically. Recently, one of the older furnaces was checked and it was not working properly. This was the furnace that serves the lounge and office area. It had to be replaced. This was one of the original furnaces that were installed as part of Pilgrim's expansion back in 1992. Fortunately, funds were available to cover the replacement of this furnace from your generous donations.

There are four more identical furnaces that were installed that same year, over 30 years ago. A new furnace runs between \$8,000 and \$10,000. Just like those costly repairs at our homes, this future cost will cause Pilgrim some financial stress unless funds are set aside to cover the inevitable need to replace additional furnaces. These furnaces will be checked this upcoming Spring and it is highly likely that more furnaces will need replacement.

Some may question why Pilgrim would continue to invest in our building in light of recent conversations about transitions. No decisions are imminent. Pilgrim Lutheran Church continues on as a congregation as it stands now. It may continue to be a home for our congregation well in the future. The building may be repurposed. Thus, it becomes imperative to plan ahead and replenish Pilgrim's Furnace Fund.

As beloved members of our congregation, you have generously supported Pilgrim to help the church survive difficult times in the past. Please give prayerful consideration to pledging your support to help build the reserve for furnaces. Our goal is to raise \$40,000 in two years. Please return the pledge card indicating your commitment by February 16, 2025 (extras blank cards are available on the information table in the lounge). Payments can be made over the two-year period. Donations to the furnace fund can be designated by using the special occasion envelopes in the back of your church envelope packet and noting "Furnace Fund."

Sing a song full of the faith that the dark past has taught us; sing a song full of the hope that the present has brought us, facing the rising sun of our new day begun, let us march on till victory is won.

This hymn is a prayer of thanksgiving to God for the progress in racial equality that has been made and a plea for faithfulness and freedom. It asks God to help us remain faithful to the tasks before us. Much has been accomplished in our country toward racial justice and equality. Much remains to be done, not just for African Americans but for *many* groups of people regardless of their ethnic or racial heritage.

Our prayer during Black History month, and all year long is that we don't forget our history AND that we keep our eyes focused on the hope that the present brings us. We can face the rising sun of each new day, moving deliberately to a time when true racial justice exists in our native land. That will be a time of victory.

The words of this hymn were written by James Weldon Johnson and the music was composed by his brother J. Rosamond Johnson. Not all of us have the talent to create such amazing poetry and music. <u>All</u> of us have the power to sing these words with our mouths and through our actions as we become what we sing.

MEETING CALLED TO OR-DER: Shirley Ecker called the meeting to order at 6:35 p.m. Devotions were led by Jean Trempe and focused on Ephesians 4:17-5:1, Paul's message about having a new life in Christ and sheading our old life as old clothing. Our new life in Christ has a future, just as our Church has new life and a future.

SECRETARY'S REPORT:

(Jean Trempe) Review of minutes from December 10,2025 regular council meeting. A motion to accept the minutes was made by Jim Lenselink and seconded by Sue Koerten. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

(Charlie Freiberg) Reviewed financial reports for December 2024. Cash in banks totaled \$77,539, with \$21,767 held as restricted funds. The largest portion of restricted funds is for Blessings that Give Hope of \$12,705. Our long-term loan stands at \$60,573. Contributions are on par for the month. For the twelve months the church's equity stands at \$17,426 (cash –

debts) Expenses are in line with prior months. Charlene Buttner made a motion to accept the Treasurer's report, and it was seconded by Jim Lenselink. Motion carried.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: (Shirley Ecker)

- ◆ The committee consists of Eugene Viegut, Jenni Zaitz and Katie Ecker. The following nominations will be brought forward at the annual meeting on January 26,2025:
 - President Jean Trempe
 - Vice President Frank Koerten
 - Stewardship Jim Lenselink
 - Secretary Linda Konkel
 - Pilgrim's Endowment needs to fill positions for a secretary and possibly one other position currently held by Larry Brandenburg.
 - Members of the nominations committee are needed.
 Two former council members and two members at large from the congregation are needed.
 - The Children and Youth and Evangelism positions will not be filled at this time.
- ◆ The new council will be installed on Sunday February 2. All council members should plan to attend.
- Applications for the Internship process have not been submitted and the deadline for Luther will not be met. Synod Staff have not responded to emails.
- Jeanette will be asking Eugene for assistance with the audit of the church's financials prior to the annual meeting.

- ◆ Reviewed the annual meeting agenda for January 26, 2025. The annual reports have already been printed. A revised agenda will be available the day of the meeting.
- ◆ Good Shepherd has asked for volunteers to assist with their commitment to serving as an overflow sight for the unhoused for February 9-15. Interested volunteers should attend a training session on January 20. Contact Laurie Sturzenegger at Good Shepherd or Shirley Ecker at Pilgrim for more information.

VICE PRESIDENT'S RE-PORT: (Jeanette Carlson) No report

WORSHIP REPORT: (Sue Koerten)

On January 23, Delores and Sue will meet with worship leaders from St. Stephen, Good Sheperd and Immanuel to discuss plans for shared services during the Lenten season.

CHILDREN AND YOUTH:

(Terra Ecker) No Report. Charlene Buttner mentioned that some multi-generational activities may be planned.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS:

(Kay Palmer) Focus continues on finding a solution to the church's custodial needs. Kay has assessed that there is a need for a 4-5 hour a week person focused on cleaning. She is waiting for a quote from Service Master. In the meantime, Kay will contact St. Stephen's part-time person to see if there is an interest in either temporary or ongoing part-time cleaning. Linda Konkel also knows of an individual that may be interested. He previously had a cleaning company. It was suggested that the congregation be informed as volunteers may be

needed to help clean in the short term. Thank you, Fred and Kay, for handling some of our immediate needs.

Kay has reviewed the tasks that should be handled routinely. There are a number of things that the prior custodial person took care of that fall outside of routine cleaning. Small repairs and maintenance projects will fall to the buildings and grounds committee as it has previously. Contractors will be brought in for larger projects as usual.

Also, under consideration is finding some grants for replacement of the roof over the lounge area and preservation of the skylights.

TRANSITION TASK FORCE:

(Kay Palmer) Thanks to all who attended the Town Hall meeting on January 12. The conversation was helpful in defining and recognizing the wishes of our congregation as we take the next steps. These conversations will be critical as Pilgrim's Transition Team meets with the GPS (Good Shepherd, Pilgrim, St. Stephen) team in building the possibilities of going forward.

The GPS team is shifting gears to bring more action to exploring how we can work together. The next meeting will be at Pilgrim on January 21. Pastor Karoline will be facilitating an exercise that will focus on building the church going forward what would meet the needs of the new joint congregation and our community. We will consider the building blocks of Church as Learning, Worship, Witness, Service and Support. GPS is planning a workday on January 25 focused on what we could do better together. We can expect to hear of more activities that will include more of us. All of the results will be reported at

our next town hall meeting.

EVANGELISM (Linda Konkel) No report

BLESSINGS THAT GIVE HOPE (Jeff Kessel) BTGH provided many items for needy students at John Marshall Elementary and Horace Mann Middle Schools before Christmas vacation. Items included waterproof ski gloves, many snacks, winter clothing, Christmas gifts for 9 Horace Mann students and \$5.00 vouchers for use at both schools' winter wish stores.

Needs exist all year long, not just at the beginning of the school year or at holiday time. Blessings that Give Hope will keep in touch with both schools to provide help where needed throughout the winter and spring.

LIFE AND GROWTH (Janet Williams) No Report

STEWARDSHIP (Jim Lenselink) A meeting was held on December 22. We discussed the furnace situation and opted to bring fundraising discussions back to

council. We reviewed the Faith Inspiration and Opportunity form and pared it down. Stewardship Sunday will be February 2.

The council discussed the need to raise funds for the potential of replacing four furnaces all installed in 1991. The plan is to have these furnaces inspected this spring and determine how many of them require replacement. Consensus was that a fund drive should be initiated as of February 1, 2025 requesting pledges to be paid off over 2 years ending February 1, 2027. The goal is to raise \$40,000 which would cover all four furnaces. This will be shared at the annual meeting with a letter and pledge cards going out to members shortly thereafter. The possibility of seeking some grants was also discussed. Focus on Energy was mentioned as was possible ELCA grants.

A motion was made by Jim Lenselink to initiate fund raising efforts for four furnaces as of February 1,2025, with a goal of raising \$40,000 by February 1, 2027. Charlie Freiberg seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Progress articles are due January 24, 2024.
